## **Annual President's report for 2021**

2021 proved to be another year of great upheaval for Sydney, New South Wales, Australia and nations far and wide. Could 2020 be repeated...yes to a large extent it was as regards COVID-19. I hope and pray 2022 will be the year that breaks the pandemic cycle. As one who has had the infection, fortunately quite trivial symptoms, I am mindful of just how contagious COVID-19 is!

The AUSCPS Executive has again acted with due diligence inasmuch as complying with the COVID-19 regulations stipulated by both the Inner West Council from whom we hire 'Woodstock' and also the NSW Department of Health. I particularly thank Sean Polivnick for his keeping abreast of the sometimes complex requirements necessary to safeguard everyone's welfare.

Whilst COVID-19 resulted in the AUSCPS having to cancel a number of monthly meetings, we were able to participate in the 2021 Sydney Royal Easter Show (SRES) and the Collectors' Plant Fair (CPF). From a public relations perspective, both events provide the Society with immense exposure, and in the case of the latter, the most lucrative income source currently available. The excitement and expectation of dedicated plant enthusiasts patronising the CPF is palpable and the hard work of setting-up the sales and display areas and their subsequent disassembly, let alone logistical details as regards packing/unpacking and transportation, are very readily compensated by patrons' raw passion for CPs. Whilst the CPF is at times good natured 'bedlam,' the SRES in contrast, is air conditioned, relatively polite and sedate. Importantly, unlike the CPS, many people passing through the pavilion, may have very little knowledge of plants, and in particular CPs, thus the Society's presence is both I believe interesting and educative.

Without doubt the December Christmas Show and sales proved to be the highlight of the AUSCPS events at Woodstock this year. It was probably the most well patronised and most comprehensive display of plants to date mounted by the AUSCPS. The 'buzz' in the room (and I am in this context not referring to pollinators or pests), was palpable. There were many first time attendees who were understandably amazed and astounded by the diverse range of plants on display and also for sale. Needless to say, there were many thrilled patrons and equally satisfied merchants. Well done all and thank you Robert Gibson for playing Resident Photographer on the night.

Members are indebted to some hard-working Executive and Committee members who undertake much work in the background. I would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank those members whose collective talents and dedication enable the AUSCPS to truly 'blossom and grow'.

Glenn Carson has assumed production of the 'Carniflora News' with great aplomb and seamlessly carried on from when Dave Colbourn 'passed the baton'. Glenn's enthusiasm with this important communication to the wider membership plus his management of the Society's library are greatly appreciated. Glenn's collaborative approach is also very much valued.

Dave Colbourn as the Society's Treasurer, has managed the finances well. 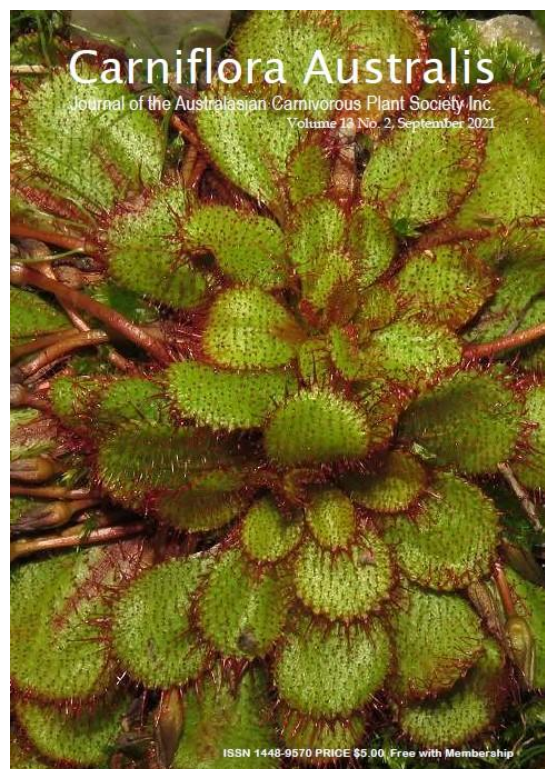

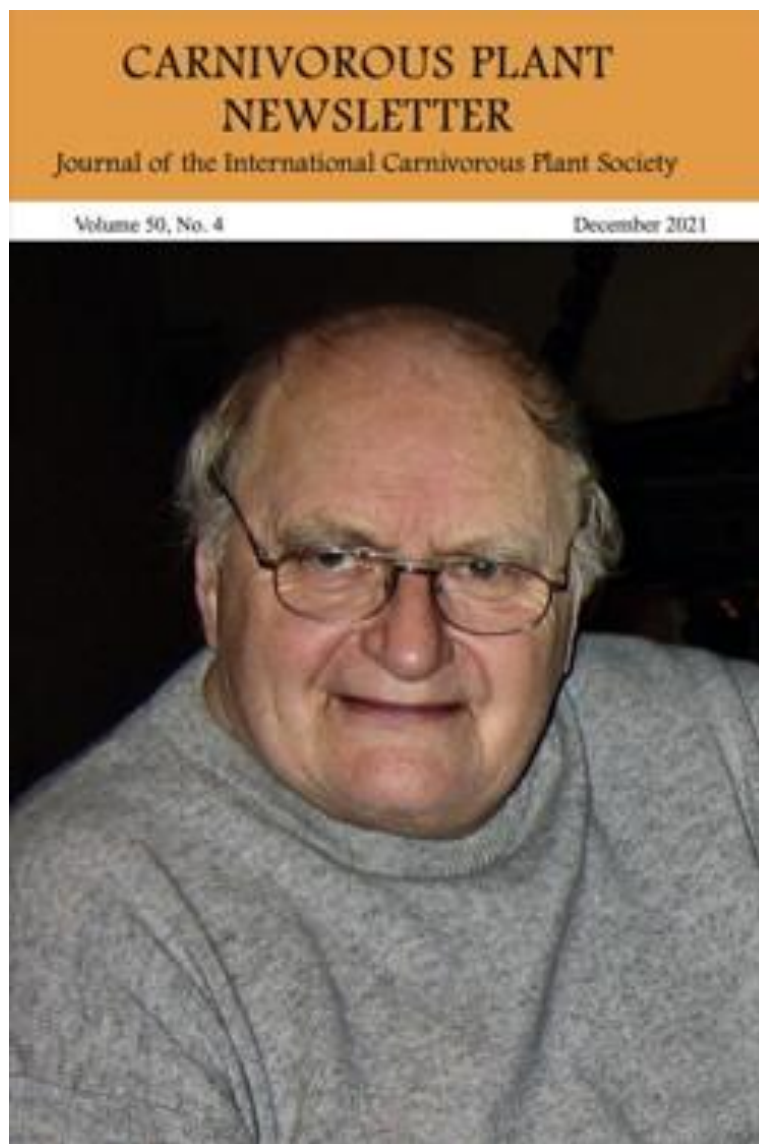

## MEETINGS

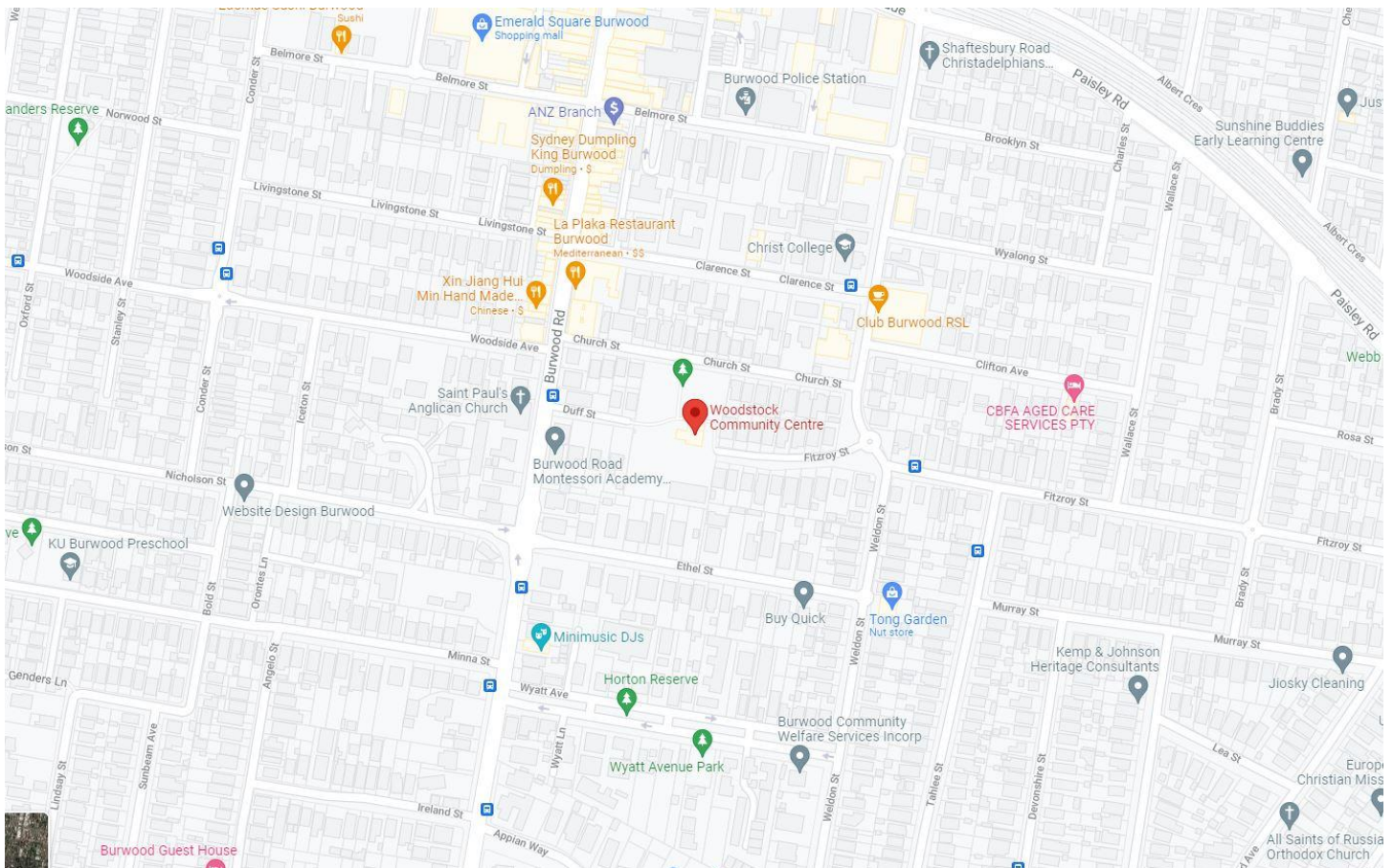

We hope you can attend one of our meetings and enjoy the fellowship of other enthusiasts for these wonderful plants.

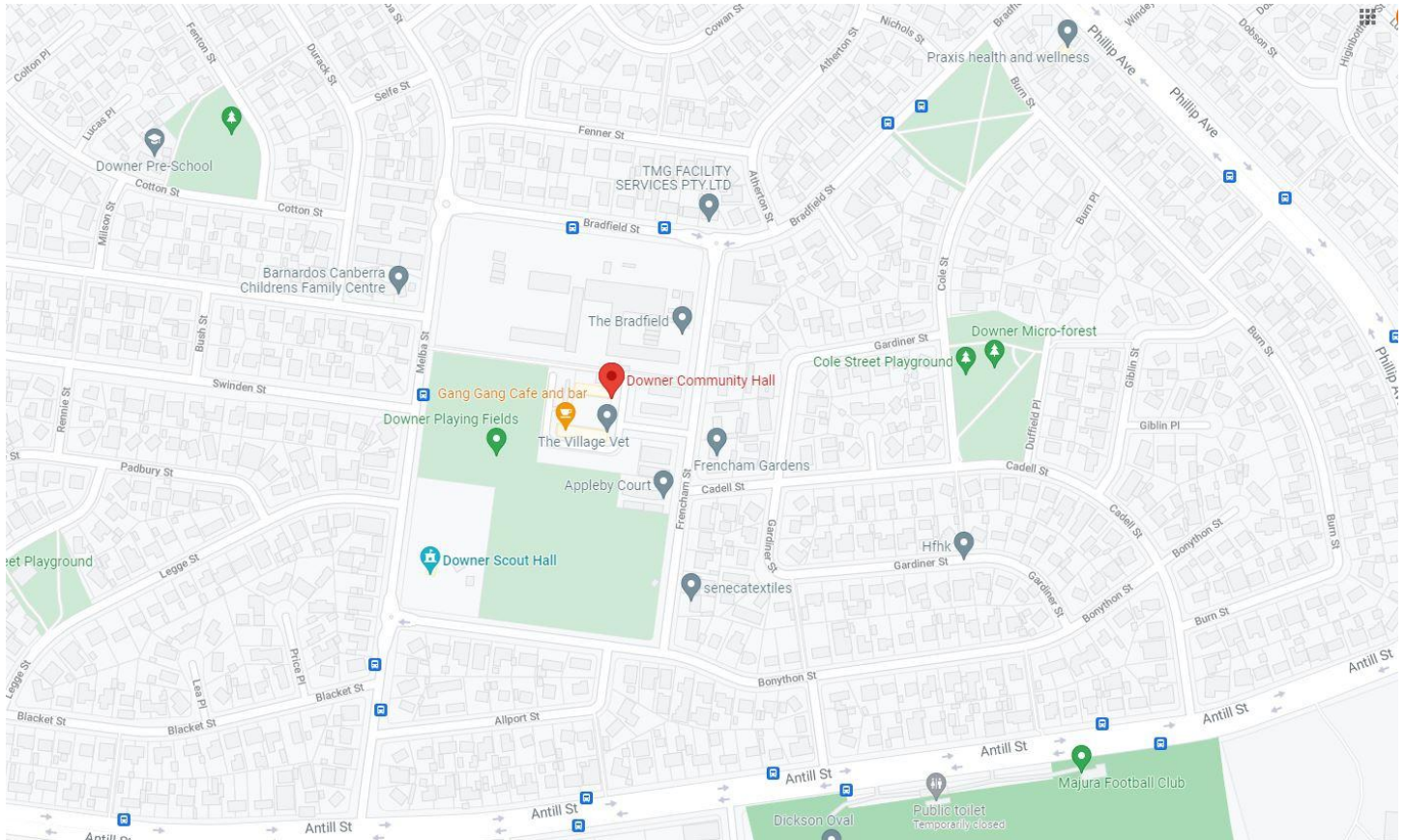
### **SYDNEY**

The meeting opened at 7:30 pm.

The meeting was themed for VFT and Christmas. Notable food contributions demonstrated the creativity of the Hetherington household with VFT shaped mini sausage rolls and decorated cupcakes.

23 people attended. David Colbourn and Glenn Carson came down from Sydney bringing plants to sell and the society seed bank for members. Local members also had several plants for sale and trade.

Anthony from Goulburn was rewarded for his superb Trays of VFT 'Big Tomato' and 'Jerk' with plant of the month award and a superb prize of *Drosera schizandra* grown and donated by Bob Little.

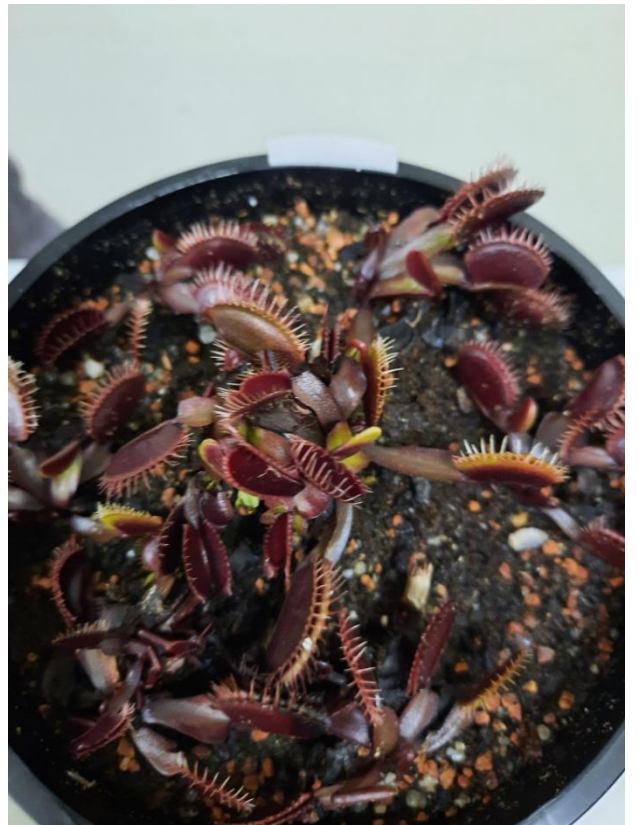

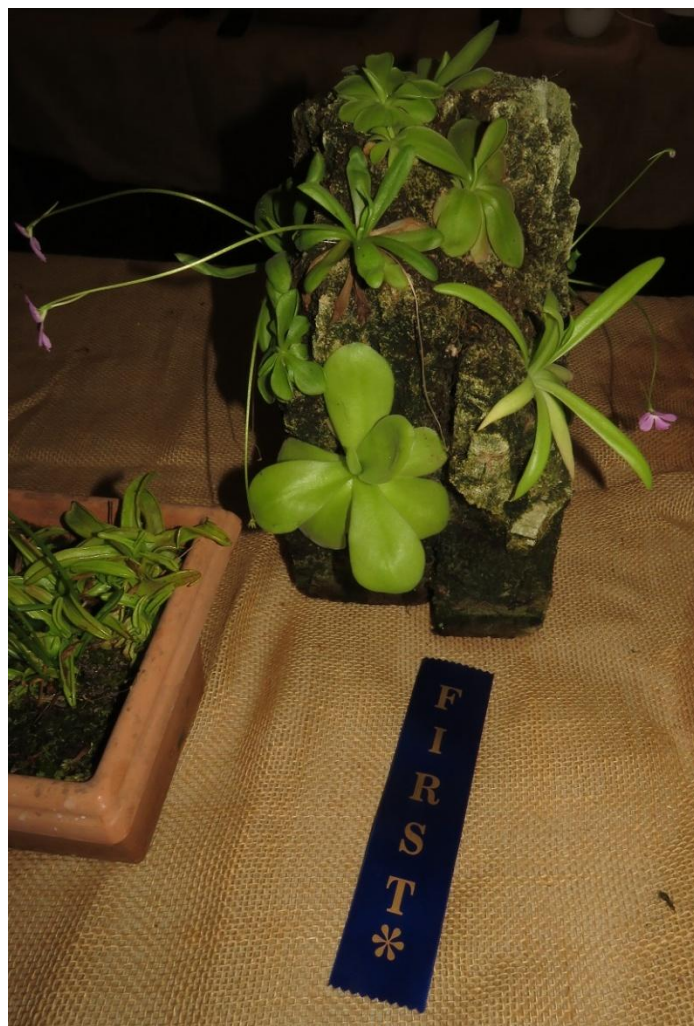

## IN THE GREENHOUSE

### **ALDROVANDA**

Plants are in active growth. Consider adding fresh decomposing leaf litter to the water to add CO<sub>2</sub>. Keep frogs and tadpoles out of the water, as they may eat the plants. Plants may be grown in shade to reduce algae growth.

### **BROCCHINIA / CATOPSIS**

Maintain high light levels and humidity. Water from above and protect from frost. Feed with 1/4 strength urea free liquid fertiliser every 4 weeks or so.

### **BYBLIS**

*B. gigantea* and *B. lamellata* will be in full growth. Flowering occurs in Spring and Summer. Cross pollinate flowers using the “Buzz” technique to produce fertile seed. Keep the soil moist.

The northern annual species of *Byblis* may be sown now. Germination commences when temperatures regularly reach 30°C. Artificial heat and/or smoke/GA3 treatment will induce germination.

### **CEPHALOTUS**

Keep the soil moist but well drained. Avoid fungal problems by keeping good air movement around the plants. Flowering occurs in mid to late Spring. Leaf and pitcher cuttings may be taken now.

### **DARLINGTONIA**

*Darlingtonia* is in active growth with pitcher and flower production. The stolons may appear at the edge of the pots. The stolons may be detached and cut into 4-5cm lengths to produce new plants. Watch out for hot days. Place your plants in more shade or consider bringing them indoors during hot weather. Night temperatures are increasing so it is imperative that the roots are kept cool.

### **DIONAEA**

All VFT cultivars should be in active growth, with flowers starting to die. Harvest seed. Many varieties will begin to produce upright petioles and traps, a strategy to compete with surrounding vegetation. Keep well watered. Watch for aphid attack.

### **DROSERA**

Tuberous *Drosera* are now dormant. Stop watering the pots and allow them to dry out. Tubers may now be unearthed to inspect and repot the tubers.

Pygmy *Drosera* will be entering their dormancy with the production of white stipule buds. Pygmy *Drosera* also flower this time of the year. Plants may be kept moister to keep in active growth.

Other Winter growing species such as *D. ramentacea*, *D. cistiflora* and *D. pauciflora* will become dormant. Reduce watering and keep the pots barely moist.

Tropical and sub-tropical species will be in full growth and flower. Keep the soil very moist. Collect seed and sow onto peat based media.

Temperate *Drosera* such as *D. filiformis*, *D. intermedia* and *D. rotundifolia* will be in active growth and flower. Pollinate the flowers and harvest seed.

## **DROSOPHYLLUM**

*Drosophyllum* will be in active growth and requires frequent feeding. In the absence of insect prey, a 1/4 strength urea free liquid fertiliser applied to the leaves is fine. *Drosophyllum* tolerates higher soil moisture levels during the cooler months and may be watered using the tray method. As temperatures increase, reduce watering and keep the soil just moist. Flowering commences in Spring. Flowers are self fertile.

## **GENLISEA**

*Genlisea* should be in flower and active growth. Keep the water levels high. Keep warm and in bright light.

## **HELIAMPHORA**

Keep plants in a bright and humid location. Light levels may be increased with the cooler nights. Feed with 1/4 strength urea free liquid fertiliser.

Flowering occurs during Spring. Collect pollen using the “buzz” technique and use to pollinate the next flower on the scape or another flower.

## **NEPENTHES**

Some *Nepenthes* struggle over the Australian summer. Aim to keep the lowland plants warm to hot and in high humidity. Highland species require cooler nights. Mist in the afternoon to reduce air temperatures and increase humidity.

## **PINGUICULA**

Most Mexican species/hybrids are ending their dormancy. Keep the soil drier until growth resumes. Some of the non-carnivorous leaves may be removed for leaf cuttings.

Warm-temperate species such as *P. primuliflora* and *P. lusitanica* will continue growth. Flowering occurs in the Spring. Keep the water up to *P. primuliflora* and take leaf cuttings.

## **RORIDULA**

*Roridula* is in active growth. Flowering occurs in Winter and Spring. Sow seed now onto moist peat/sand. Germination may take 3-8 weeks. Keep the soil moist and place in very bright situations. Ensure good air circulation to avoid fungal attack of the seedlings.

## **SARRACENIA**

All *Sarracenia* species/hybrids are in active growth. *S. flava* and *S. oreophila* species look their best in spring. Keep water level up and keep in full sun.

## **UTRICULARIA**

Most terrestrial *Utricularia* will be in active growth and flower. Keep moist to wet. Flowering will resume.

Aquatic *Utricularia* are in active growth.

Winter growing species, such as *U. multifida* and *U. menziesii* will begin to end their growing cycle and go dormant as temperatures increase and soils dry out.

Tropical *Utricularia* - Maintain higher temperatures, humidity and air movement. Keep soil moist during the warmer months.



## MERCHANDISE

### CONTACT CARDS

### **FIELD GUIDE TO THE CARNIVOROUS PLANTS OF SYDNEY AND THE BLUE MOUNTAINS**

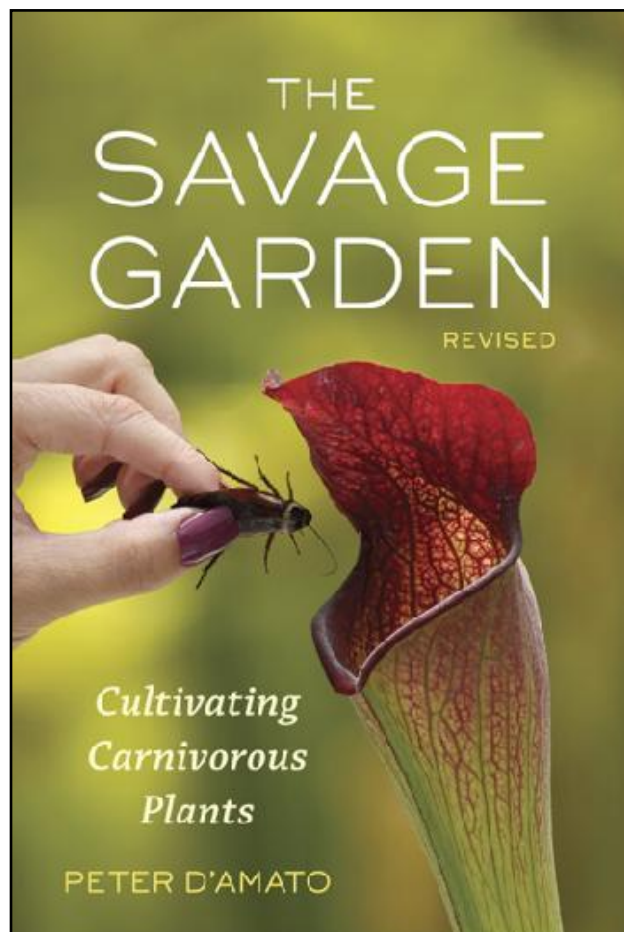
