## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

### NOMINATIONS FOR THE COMMITTEE

Our A.G.M. is planned for 10th July 2026 meeting in Sydney. One of the objectives at this meeting is to elect committee members. We are a national society, and as such, members from across Australia are eligible to be nominated for each position. A description of each elected position is contained below. **Included with this newsletter are instructions on how to nominate members for the listed positions and a nomination form.**

A list of nominations will then be published in June and voted on at the A.G.M. Interstate / international members will be able to make their vote via proxy. Please consider volunteering for the Society by standing for one of the roles.

The roles and their descriptions are:

**President** - The President oversees all the Society's activities and will chair General, Extraordinary, and Annual General meetings in accordance with proper business meeting etiquette. The President casts the 'Deciding Vote' in the event of a deadlock arising from a motion or other matters requiring a vote at Committee level. The President will need good communication, people management, motivational, organisational and delegation skills.

**Vice President** - The Vice President is responsible for the overall operation of the Society in the absence or otherwise incapacity of the President. The Vice President requires good communication, teamwork and organisational skills.

**Treasurer** - The Treasurer shall ensure that correct books and accounts are kept showing the financial affairs of the Society. These records shall be available for inspection by any member and shall be held in the custody of the Treasurer. A financial report is to be presented at the A.G.M. The Treasurer will need good accounting and communication skills.

**Secretary** - The Secretary unless another person is so appointed by the Committee is responsible for the incoming and outgoing business correspondence for the Society. Including but not limited to reading emails and letters, and mail out of Journals. The Secretary shall ensure that records of the Constitution/Rules of the Society and minutes of all general and committee meetings are kept. These records shall be available for inspection by any member and shall be held in the custody of the Secretary.

**Membership Secretary** - The Membership Officer is automatically appointed as Public Officer unless another person is appointed by the Committee and shall ensure that the register of members is kept up to date. Membership records shall be available for inspection by any member and shall be held in custody of the Membership Secretary.

## MEETINGS

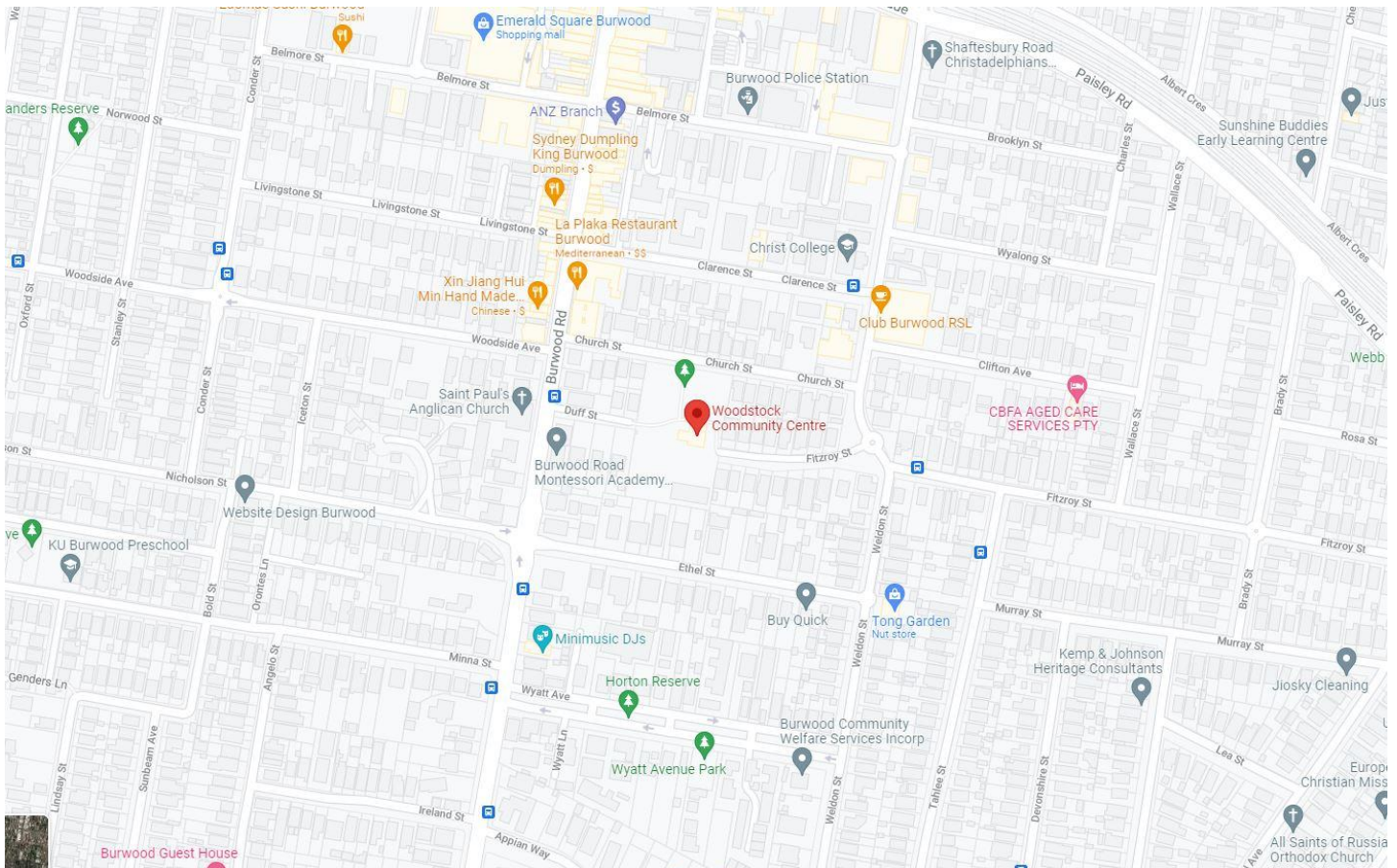

We hope you can attend one of our meetings and enjoy the fellowship of other enthusiasts for these wonderful plants.

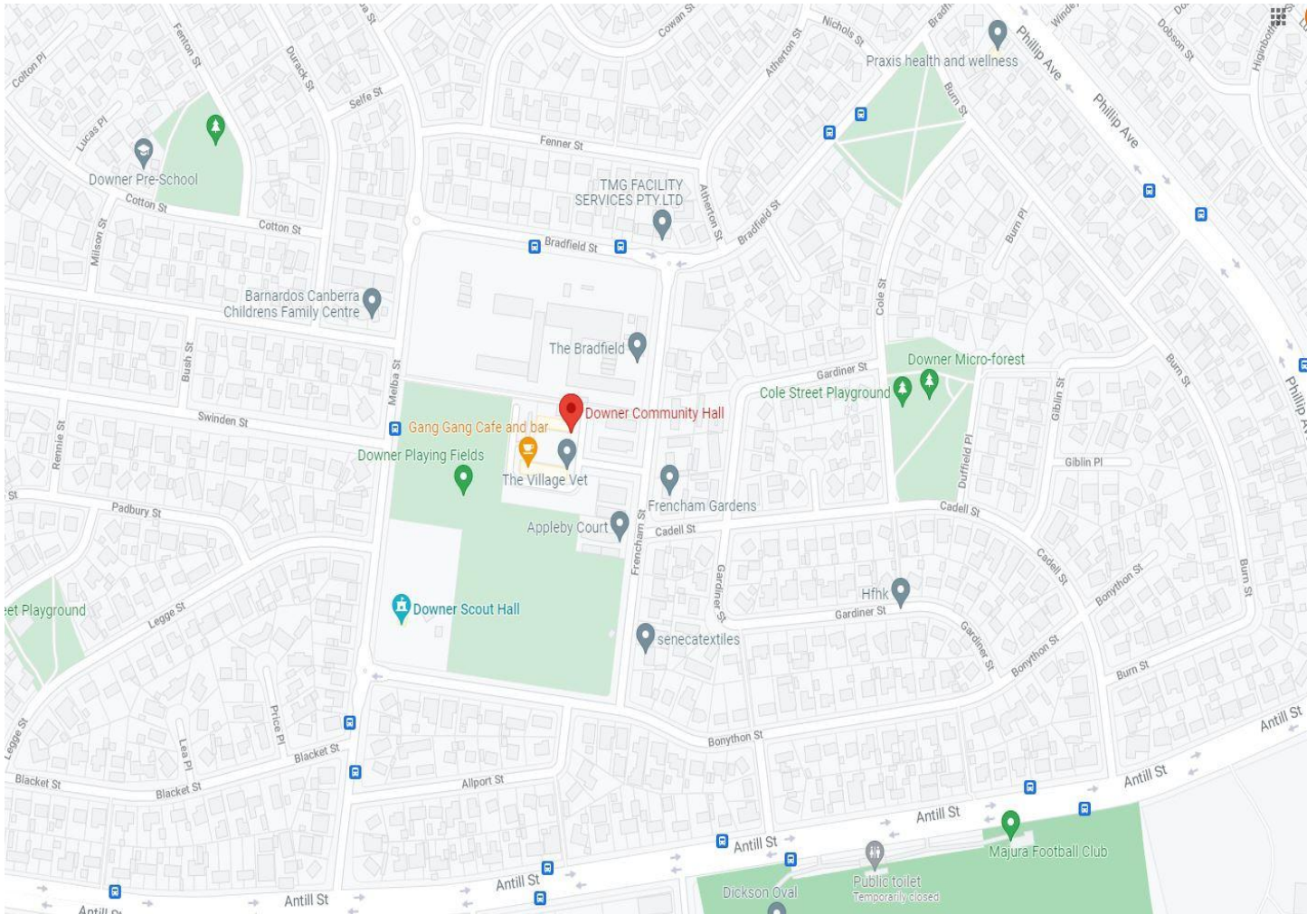

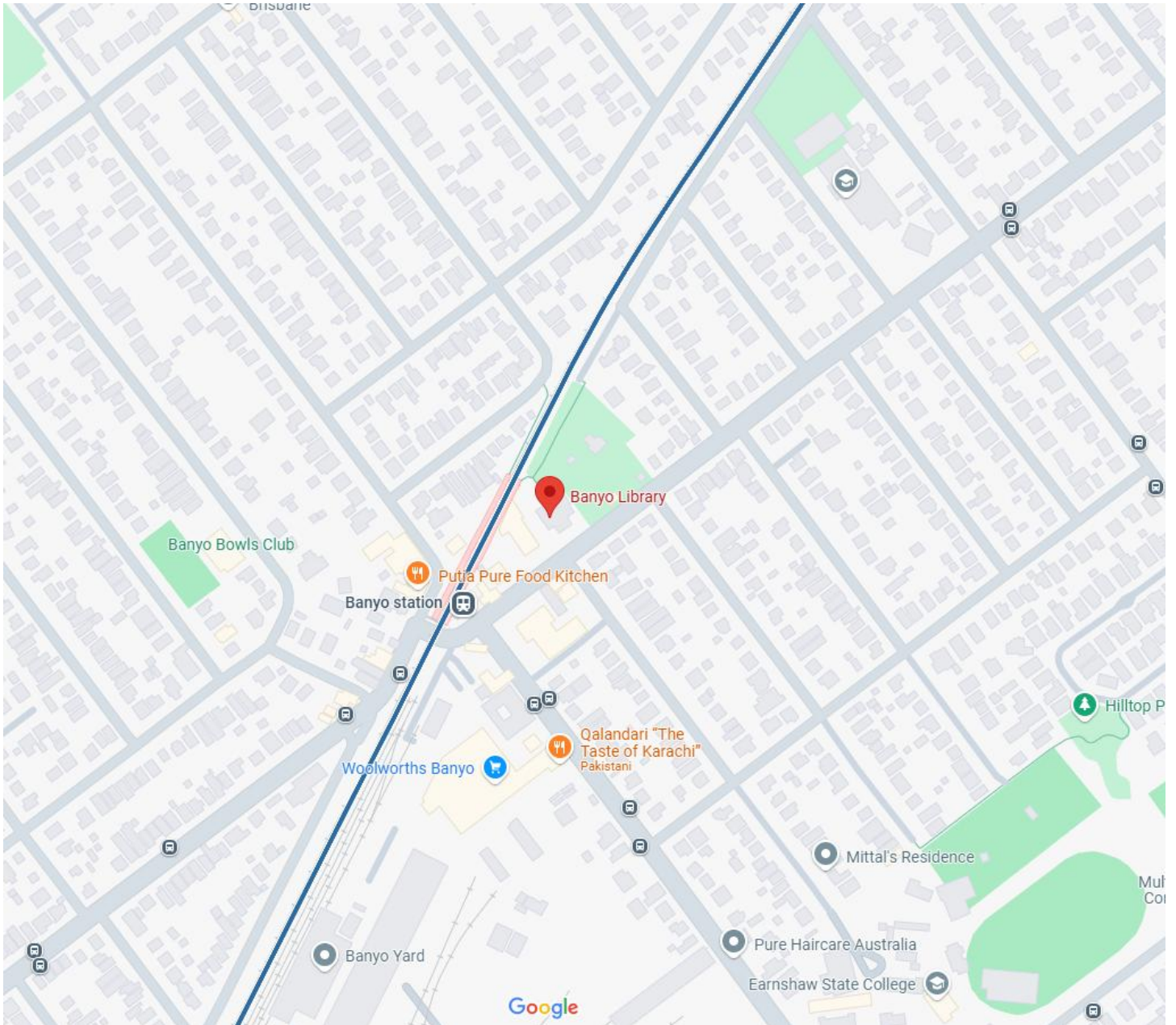

MINUTES FRIDAY, 10<sup>TH</sup> of APRIL 2026

## **Minutes of Previous Meeting**

The minutes of the 10 April 2026 meeting were tabled.

## **Business Arising / General Business**

### **1. AUSCPS Plant Fair – Sunday 19 April 2026 (Feedback)**

Thanks were extended to all involved. Although there was initial uncertainty about holding the event on a Sunday, the day proved highly successful. Attendance was strong, and the relaxed Sunday atmosphere appeared to encourage visitors to browse and enjoy the fair.

### **2. AUSCPS Winter Show – Friday 12 June 2026**

There will be no formal meeting on this night. Set-up begins at 7:15 pm. Members wishing to exhibit must be financial members. Categories include Nepenthes, Sarracenia, Drosera, Pinguicula, Native Carnivorous Plants, and Other Carnivorous Plants. Prize money will be awarded, and the Grand Champion will receive a new ribbon. Judging will shift to a collective expert format, with Marlon now an accredited judge at the Royal Easter Show.

### **3. Annual General Meeting – Friday 10 July 2026**

Members are encouraged to consider nominating for committee positions. Positions open for nomination: President, Vice President, Treasurer, Membership Secretary, Minute Secretary, and Committee Member. The AGM notice appeared in the previous newsletter as required.

#### **4. Plant Lovers Fair – Kariong, 19–20 September 2026**

An invitation has been received. While it is a strong event, plant condition at that time of year is a concern. The committee is considering whether to attend. At present, attendance is unlikely, but members will be notified if this changes.

#### **5. Collectors Plant Fair – Penrith, 10–11 April 2027**

Dates for the 2027 autumn fair have been announced. The President has proposed that the Society does not attend and instead hold its own event around the same time—possibly the week prior. Planning will continue over the coming months.

#### **6. ICP Conference Proposal – 2028 (Darwin)**

A proposal is being prepared to host the 2028 International Carnivorous Plant Conference in Darwin, likely submitted at the end of this month. Key points:

- Proposed venue: George Brown Botanic Gardens, featuring extensive tropical and monsoonal plantings.
- The gardens currently lack a carnivorous plant collection; the Society is exploring ways to supply suitable plants, navigating NT quarantine requirements.
- The Society intends to donate plants for a permanent collection.
- Planned format: three-day conference, 12 speakers, theme to be confirmed.
- Initial costs will cover venue hire and logistics, with ticket sales expected to offset expenses. This initiative aligns strongly with the Society’s charter to promote and cultivate carnivorous plants.

### **Membership Report**

The Membership Secretary was not in attendance.

#### **Guest Presentation – Lorraine Emerson, President, Garden Clubs of Australia**

Lorraine Emerson addressed the meeting, outlining the role of Garden Clubs of Australia, representing 800 clubs and 52,000 members nationwide. She also coordinates over 30 clubs and community gardens across the Inner West and Eastern Suburbs. She highlighted the organisation’s comprehensive insurance coverage for members during club activities and travel.

## Gardening Australia Feature

A Gardening Australia segment featuring Oliver Evans (Eat Me Exotics) was shown.

### Raffle

Oliver donated a *Nepenthes* for the raffle. **Winner:** Ian Woolf.

### Presentation – *Nepenthes* Cuttings (Oliver Evans)

Oliver shared practical advice on propagating *Nepenthes*, including:

- Always sterilise cutting tools (heat or rubbing alcohol).
- Use coco coir/peat with fine perlite for moisture retention.
- Leave 1–2 leaves on each node; cuttings without leaves were unsuccessful.
- Cutting leaves in half is optional—useful mainly when space is limited.
- Leave pitchers on if possible; they help maintain hydration.
- Cut stems on an angle to encourage root development.
- Large species (e.g., *N. truncata*, *N. veitchii*) are prone to rot; rooting hormones showed no significant benefit.
- Best time for cuttings: early spring growth flush (late September).
- Oliver grows cuttings in 75% humidity, under lights, with heat mats in winter.

## Plant of the Month – *Nepenthes*

Twenty-two plants were presented, including examples of *truncata*, *ampullaria*, *lowii*, multiple tiger hybrids, *rafflesiana*, *ventricosa* × *edwardsiana*, *hookeriana*, and others.

**Winner:** *Nepenthes lowii* grown by **Oliver Evans**.

# IN THE GREENHOUSE — EARLY WINTER

## ALDROVANDA

Growth slows significantly as water temperatures drop.

- Plants may enter partial dormancy depending on your climate and water depth.
- Reduce feeding; avoid adding fresh leaf litter now, as decomposition slows in cold water.
- Keep frogs and tadpoles out of the water.
- Provide maximum sun to maintain water warmth and prevent die-back.
- If plants form turions, leave them undisturbed.

## BROCCHINIA / CATOPSIS

These bromeliads tolerate cooler nights but still need:

- Very bright light to compensate for shorter days.
- Good humidity.
- Water from above to keep the leaf tanks flushed.
- Fertilise lightly ( $\frac{1}{4}$  strength, urea-free) every 4–6 weeks, as metabolism slows in winter.

## BYBLIS

### *B. gigantea* & *B. lamellata* (Perennial species)

These are winter growers and now entering strong active growth.

- Keep soil moist to wet.
- Flowering increases; harvest seed.
- Growth improves with prey or light fertilisation (fish food, rotting fruit nearby).
- Continue hand-pollination using the buzz technique.

### Northern annual species

These are also in active winter growth.

- Growth is strongest in warm, humid microclimates.
- Cross-pollinate for reliable seed set.
- Supplement feeding as above.

## CEPHALOTUS

Cooler weather benefits them.

- Keep soil moist but never waterlogged.
- Ensure excellent air movement to prevent winter fungal issues.
- Growth slows but remains steady.
-

## **DARLINGTONIA**

Cooler temperatures are ideal now.

- Plants are in active winter growth.
- Stolons continue to develop underground.
- Root cooling is naturally easier but avoid warm spells.
- Provide bright light and excellent water quality.

## **DIONAEA (Venus Flytraps)**

Plants are entering dormancy.

- Expect traps to shrink and growth to slow.
- Keep soil moist, not wet.
- Remove dead leaves to prevent fungal issues.
- Full sun still essential.

## **DROSERA**

### **Tuberous Drosera**

Now breaking dormancy and beginning active winter growth.

- Repotting should already be complete.
- Increase watering gradually as shoots appear.
- Keep soil moist but never waterlogged.

### **Pygmy Drosera**

Now exiting summer dormancy.

- Stipule buds open and new growth begins.
- Increase watering to maintain moist conditions.
- Ideal time for gemmae formation later in winter.

### **Winter-growing species (*D. cistiflora*, *D. pauciflora*)**

These are just beginning growth.

- Keep soil barely moist until strong shoots appear.
- Increase watering as growth accelerates.

### **Tropical & subtropical Drosera**

Still in full growth.

- Keep soil very moist.
- Continue collecting seed and sowing onto peat mixes.

## Temperate *Drosera* (*filiformis*, *intermedia*, *rotundifolia*)

Entering or already in dormancy.

- Growth slows; leaves may die back.
- Keep soil moist, not saturated.
- Harvest any mature seed.

## DROSOPHYLLUM

Cool, dry winter conditions suit them well.

- Plants remain in active growth.
- Avoid humidity spikes.
- Flowering may begin late winter.
- Growth improves with prey capture.

## GENLISEA

Cooler temperatures slow growth slightly, but plants remain active.

- Keep water levels high.
- Maintain bright light and good humidity.

## HELIAMPHORA

Winter is ideal for them.

- Keep plants in bright, cool, humid conditions.
- Avoid temperatures above 25°C.
- Fertilise lightly (urea-free foliar feed) every 3–4 weeks.

## NEPENTHES

Winter is the stress season for many species.

- **Lowlanders:** keep warm (20–30°C) with high humidity; they may slow or stop pitching.
- **Highlanders:** enjoy cooler nights; maintain strong light.
- Mist in the afternoon to increase humidity and reduce temperature fluctuations.

## PINGUICULA

### Mexican species/hybrids

Most are in winter succulent phase.

- Reduce watering significantly.
- Keep humidity moderate and avoid wet soil.

### Warm temperate species (*P. primuliflora*, *P. lusitanica*)

Remain in active growth.

- Keep soil wet for *P. primuliflora*.
- Take leaf cuttings now.

## **RORIDULA**

Active growth continues through winter.

- Keep soil moist, not wet.
- Provide very bright light and good air movement.
- Low humidity is fine.

## **SARRACENIA**

Most species are entering dormancy.

- Growth slows; pitchers brown and die back.
- *S. flava* and *S. oreophila* may retain some phyllodia.
- *S. leucophylla* may produce a small late flush before resting.
- Keep soil moist and plants in full sun.

## **UTRICULARIA**

### **Terrestrial species**

Cooler weather slows growth, but many remain active.

- Keep soil moist to wet.
- Some species may flower in early winter.

### **Aquatic species**

Growth slows.

- Maintain clean water and control algae.

### **Winter-growing species (*U. multifida*, *U. menziesii*)**

Now breaking dormancy.

- Increase watering slightly as new growth appears.
- Keep soil just moist until growth strengthens.

### **Tropical species**

Require warmth and humidity.

- Keep soils moist and maintain good air movement.

### POTTING MIXES

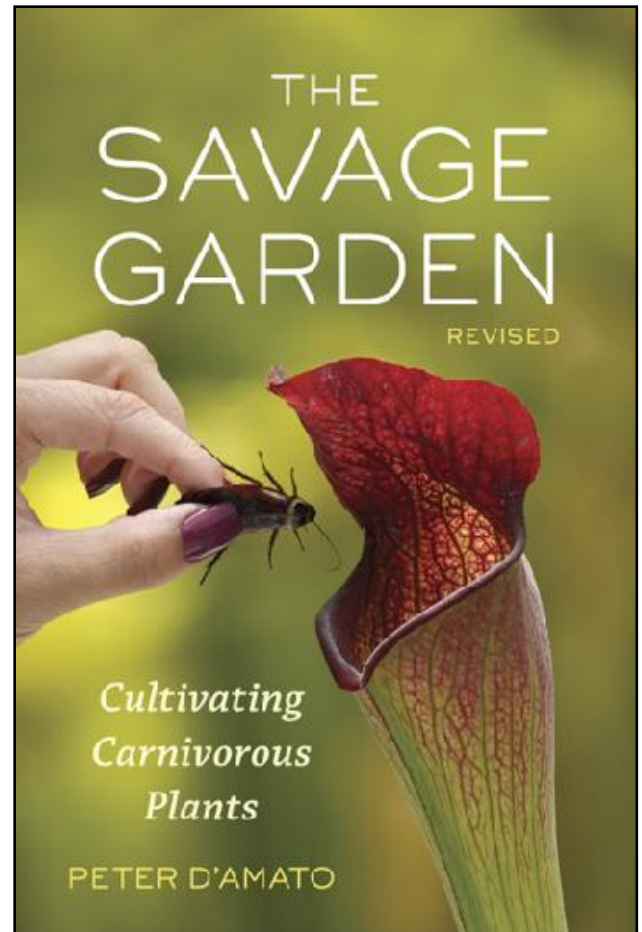

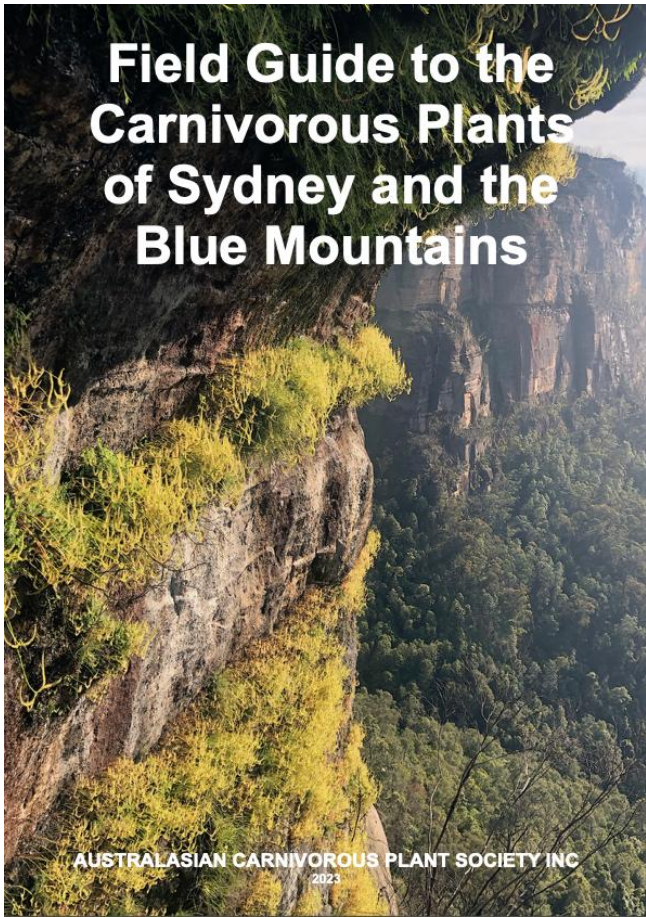


## THE SAVAGE GARDEN
